CANDIDA—George Bernard Shaw (Penguin Classics 112 pp. 0-14-303978-4 \$9.00)

CAESAR AND CLEOPATRA—George Bernard Shaw (Penguin Classics July 176 pp. 0-14-303977-6 \$10.00)

Introduction by Stanley Weintraub. Satirizes Shakespeare's use of history and comments wryly on the politics of Shaw's own time. Replaces ISBN 0-14-045036-X.

ARMS AND THE MAN—George Bernard Shaw (Penguin Classics July 112 pp. 0-14-303976-8 \$9.00)

Introduction by Rodelle Weintraub. The playwright inverts the devices of melodrama to produce this farcical play, teeming with sexual energy. Replaces ISBN 0-14-045035-1.

WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOOLF?—Edward Albee (NAL August 272 pp. 0-451-21859-0 \$12.95)

The winner of the 1961 Tony Award for Best Play—now revised by the author for the 2005 Broadway revival.

THREE BY FLANNERY O'CONNOR *Wise Blood, The Violent Bear It Away, Everything That Rises Must Converge*—Flannery O'Connor

(Signet Classics July 496 pp. 0-451-52514-0 \$7.95)
Introduction by Sally Fitzgerald. Three complete masterworks infused with the stark comic vision of the inimitable Southern writer.

THE PATHFINDER—James Fenimore Cooper (Signet Classics July 528 pp. 0-451-53019-5 \$6.95)

New Introduction by James Stauffer. *New Afterword by Thomas Berger.* Natty Bumppo finds his love divided between the woman he has pledged to protect and the untouched forest.
